

# Monday Morning Report

April 4, 2022

#### **INTERNAL**

<u>COVID-19 UPDATE</u>: Global confirmed cases this morning reached 491.5 million, with 6,153,454 fatalities. US cases are at 80.1 million with 982,566 deaths. (4/4/22) (*Johns Hopkins*). Yesterday, Texas reported 5,508,960 confirmed cases with 86,074 deaths, including in **Bexar County**: 469,501 cases with 6,091 deaths; **Guadalupe County**: 26,222 cases, with 398 deaths; **Comal County**: 21,992 cases, with 545 deaths; **Hays County**: 51,959 cases with 430 deaths; **Travis County**: 203,158 cases with 1,716 deaths; and **Williamson County**: 108,641 cases with 869 deaths (4/3/22). #### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

As part of their plan to boost domestic electric vehicle production and deployment, the Biden administration announced plans in **Washington** last week to use the Cold War-era Defense Production Act in securing supplies of various key minerals (lithium, nickel, cobalt, graphite, etc.) used in electric cars. The move could have big implications for trade & freight routes, supply chains, and **Austin-San Antonio**area auto-manufacturing. **Story**.

Add another \$750 million to the price tag for that massive I-45 rebuild in **Houston**, which officials now estimate will now cost \$9 billion due to changes requested by local jurisdictions, project delays, and increasing construction costs. The troubled project is still mired in disputes among local officials, TxDOT, and federal authorities. **Story**.

Two **Boston** academics researching autonomous vehicles argue in the pop-culture publication **Daily Beast** that fully self-driving technology is decades away and may even be ultimately impossible. "Current self-driving cars fall short, and will always fall short, because they rely upon a statistical model of the world instead of naturally embracing unexpected real-time events." Artificial intelligence won't help, they say. **Opinion**.

Environmental groups are sounding the alarm about water and waste-water usage in the Texas Hill Country, saying that current and expected population growth around towns like Boerne, Uvalde, Kerrville, and Mason is 'unsustainable,' reports the *Express-News*. It's not just more people, but people using more water. *Story*.

### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT (and Other News)**

For the fifth consecutive year, **Comal County** property values will increase by double digits, and this year's increases are projected to be the highest ever, the **Herald-Zeitung** reports. The Comal Appraisal District believes values will be up by 30-50%. *Market* values in **New Braunfels** are up by 38.1%, to \$14.594 billion. **Story**.

Applied Materials, the **Santa Clara**, California-based technology company, is considering a site near **Austin** in **Hutto** for a \$2.4 billion research & development facility that could employ hundreds in the booming Central Texas tech sector. **Details.** 

The American West is at risk of twin dangers arising from global warming: drought and wildfires followed by intense, heavy rainfall leading to mudslides and flash floods, according to a new study reported *here* by the *New York Times*. But there's good news, too: a backlash against 'doomers' on climate change is developing (*here*); and solar & wind power are meeting goals. *Details*.

"Longevity is underrated," concludes the **San Antonio** *Report* founder Robert Rivard in a tribute to **Bexar County** judge Nelson Wolff and his wife Tracy - saluting nearly 50 years of public and philanthropic service by the 'over-achieving couple,' as Wolff prepares to retire at the end of the year. *Opinion*.

Dr. Kelly Damphouse - currently chancellor/CEO of Arkansas State University - will succeed the retiring Denise Trauth as president of Texas State University in **San Marcos**, if approved by the system's regents. **Details**.
