#### **INTERNAL**

The Executive Committee of the **Austin-San Antonio** Corridor Council met last Wednesday (4/20) in **San Marcos** for project status updates, a review of recent meetings on Lone Star Rail with TxDOT, the Capital Area and the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organizations, and took action on the Council's 403(b) plan. ### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

Given all the flack in the air following Union Pacific's withdrawal from a memorandum of agreement to study use of their rail line by Lone Star Rail between **Austin** and **San Antonio**, you may want to read Lone Star chairman Sid Covington's plan for a path forward *here*. **Hays County** appointed a program director to stage a bond election for a new county jail, law and communications center. Consultants say they need 500-600 beds to meet anticipated demand and currently Hays spends \$1 million housing inmates in **Bastrop**, **Caldwell**, and **Guadalupe Counties**. More as this develops. **Story**.

Some people are predicting a major new shift in power during the next Texas Legislative session in **Austin** on how the budget is adopted: the Senate will seize control, they say, for a zero-based system that will enhance Gov. Abbott's role in the process. **Story**.

Kevin Patteson, a former administrator for the Texas Water Development Board in **Austin**, will take over as the chief executive of the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority from Bill West - who has run the agency since 1994. **Story**.

A water pipeline along US 290 may be doing more harm than good, according to scientists studying water usage in **Hays County**. "That pipeline's causing massive growth on top of an aquifer recharge zone in **[San Marcos, Wimberley,** and **Dripping Springs**]," an official says. *More*.
