INTERNAL

At last week's meeting of the **Austin-San Antonio** Corridor Council Executive Committee (5/18) members discussed developments between the two regional Metropolitan Planning Organizations regarding Lone Star Rail, a **Dallas-Ft. Worth-Austin** planning initiative on higher speed rail, the Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority, and state and federal legislative priorities for the region. **Details**.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Georgetown and **New Braunfels** topped the list of the country's fastest-growing communities - four of which are in Texas - from July 2014 to July 2015, according to the latest figures from the US Census Bureau for cities with a population greater than 50,000. **Story**.
