INTERNAL

About 150 people attended last week's Corridor Council luncheon discussion on "**San Antonio** to **Monterrey** High Speed Rail." US Congressman Henry Cuellar and TxDOT Commissioner Jeff Austin headlined with a state official and economist from Nuevo Leon.

On August 22nd at 11:30 am, the Corridor Council will host a discussion and luncheon on the *State of Central Texas* at the **Austin** Club with **Williamson County** Judge Dan A. Gattis, **Austin** mayor Steve Adler, and **San Marcos** mayor Daniel Guerrero. The moderator of the discussion will be the Editor in Chief of the *Texas Tribune*, Evan Smith. INFRASTRUCTURE

With **Austin** city officials still weighing whether to put a transportation bond before voters this fall, some transportation advocates want a light rail system on the ballot this November. A proposal was sent to City Hall calling for the bond to include a \$397.5 million, 5.3-mile starter rail line running from downtown to North **Austin**. **Story**.

Eleven Union Pacific oil train rail cars caught fire and exploded in the Columbia River Gorge near **Mosier**, Oregon over the weekend. **Portland's** mayor says his city made the right decision when it blocked the expansion of fossil-fuel pipelines, tanks and terminals within the city's limits. **Story**.

New Braunfels has completed a \$2.3 million Railroad Quiet Zone project for railroad crossings within the city, according to officials. Railroad engineers no longer have to sound their horns transiting the city. **Details**.

The US will need an estimated \$2 trillion to update existing highways, ports, schools, utilities, public buildings, railways, waterways and mass transit, according to the Bipartisan Policy Center in **Washington**. Governments can only come up with about half that amount. **Story**.
