

# Monday Morning Report

January 8, 2024

#### **INTERNAL**

### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

In year-end wrap-up stories about their achievements in 2023 and priorities for 2024, **Travis County** judge Andy Brown and **Bexar County** judge Peter Sakai both mentioned revived talks and planning for a passenger rail connection between **Austin** and **San Antonio**, but neither seemed ready to reveal specifics, yet. **Bexar**. **Travis**.

US Senator Ted Cruz and House representative Henry Cuellar were in **Laredo** last week to highlight a new law clearing roadblocks to the expansion and construction of new bridge projects in **Webb**, **Maverick**, and **Cameron Counties** linking Texas and Mexico. The law sets a 'shot clock' to force building decisions by April 2024. **Story**.

In other US-Mexico border news, a new 48-inch pipeline to move natural gas from West Texas to the Mexican coast is getting opposition from **Van Horn** (population 2,000), midway along I-10 between **El Paso** and **Midland-Odessa**. Residents cite safety concerns, but environmental groups say larger issues are involved. **Story**.

Speeding fatalities are at their highest levels in 14 years and five of the *Top 25 Most Dangerous Spots in the US* are in Texas, *Consumer Affairs* reports, but none in the **Austin-San Antonio Corridor** - where congestion may keep speeds largely at non-lethal levels. **Beaumont**, **Odessa**, **Dallas**, and **Amarillo**, not so much. *Details*.

Strong consumer demand, pricing, and climate change concerns are driving a massive surge in passenger train services across the European Union, with ridership up over 50% since 2021 - now totaling 245 billion passenger-miles per year. Governments and private investors are flocking to build new routes to meet demand. **Details**.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT (and Other News)

Despite widespread media coverage of rising heat indexes and dwindling water resources, a **New York Times** opinion-writer is advising folks not to give up on the American Southwest but to consider the changing environment as an opportunity for centuries of climate-adaptation ingenuity to be put to good use. **Opinion**.

Although more electric vehicles were sold in 2023 than the years 2016-2021 combined, industry leaders report slowing sales due to insufficient charging infrastructure and too-high prices. **Business Insider** says the slowdown is symptomatic of an uglier problem: the myth that EVs can seamlessly replace traditional cars. **Details**.

**TechCrunch** tested and compared the leading five level-3 Driver Assistance systems from BMW, Ford, GM, Mercedes, and **Austin**-based Tesla to find which one offered the best cost/benefit/safety ratio. The result: only Tesla was singled out for safety and cost criticism. **Story**.

California is moving aggressively to phase out the roughly 30,000 carbon-producing diesel trucks at the ports of **Los Angeles** and **Long Beach**, on its way to a total statewide ban over the next two decades. But high costs, maintenance issues, and even the federal government are all posing significant challenges. **Story**.

**Southern Living** has discovered the best traditional restaurant in the Texas Hill Country, naming it a 'legend of the South.' The nearly one-hundred-year-old Blue Bonnet Cafe in **Marble Falls** was cited in particular for its selection of a dozen homemade pies, and we vouch for the coconut creme: Worth every carb and calorie. **Story**.
