INTERNAL

INFRASTRUCTURE

The **Dallas**-based Texas Rail Advocates (TRA) newsletter published a blistering commentary last week on the failure of Texas Transportation Commissioners to include rail and mass transit in TxDOT's long term planning. Based upon **Streetsblog.org** reporting, TRA questions Commissioners' financial ties to the energy & auto industries and their biases toward highways, formally asking for answers to seven key questions. **Opinion**.

<u>More Than Just A Bus Line:</u> **San Antonio Report** examines to potential economic development prospects of VIA Metropolitan Transit's proposed Advanced Rapid Transit lines and other transit-oriented projects planned by the agency. VIA's 12-mile north/south route will connect the airport to the Spanish Missions, opening in 2027. **Story**.

TxDOT has announced that it will be creating a pilot 'smart freight' corridor for autonomous and other advanced-technology trucking along a 21-mile segment of State Highway 130 between Texas 71 and Texas 45 North, including areas between **Georgetown** and **Del Valle**. Initially, the project will involve a mix of hardware and software to share incident-management data with the agency and vehicles in real time. **Details**.

The *Express-News* says **Austin** has begun tracking traffic incidents involving self-driving vehicles, although the biggest offender - Cruise autonomous cars - has been temporarily off the roads for now. Incidents thus far (more than 40) are reported to the city's 3-1-1 telephone network by motorists, firefighters, and police. *Story*.

A new federal rule issued last week in **Washington** requires states to set goals for reducing carbon emissions from cars and trucks on their roads, an effort to link infrastructure spending to environmental goals. *Story*. TxDOT plans to use \$641 million in carbon emissions reduction funding to add highway lanes, arguing that reduced congestion equals reduced emissions - though some science suggests otherwise. *Story*. *Study*. *Study* #2.

As groundwater supplies dwindle across the West, Mid-West, and Southwest, the **New York Times** reports that even conservative farmers and ranchers in states like Kansas, Montana, and Nevada are beginning to wonder if it's time for the federal government - with a longstanding aversion to intervening in state water disputes - should step in to regulate groundwater resources across the United States. **Story. More.**

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT (and Other News)

This week marks the start of the Conference of Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP 28) in **Dubai** and, in the run-up to the global gathering, a raft of new reports are being issued with hopes of influencing the debate over climate reparations to affected countries. **Story**. Meanwhile, Nobel prize-winning scientist John Clauser joined a press conference in **Washington** to declare 'there is no crisis.' **Details**.

The **Austin** Area Research Organization (AARO) is hosting a one-day summit, December 4^{th,} to discuss 'regional challenges and trends at the cross-section of multiple, inter-related policy issues.' Civic leaders, elected officials, and business representatives from a six-county Central Texas region (**Travis**, **Williamson**, **Hays**, **Bastrop**, **Caldwell** and **Burnet Counties**) are expected. **Details**.

After at least a decade of stories about Californians fleeing to Texas because of taxes, extreme weather, housing affordability and partisan politics, **Business Insider** now says people are fleeing from Texas over the same concerns. **Story**. A University of Texas at **Austin** professor, expert in satellite communications, has been called in to solve 'unthinkable' GPS spoofing attacks on commercial airplanes in the Middle East that started in late September.
